The meeting was called to order and Mono PSB Chair Brenda Teeter welcomed those in attendance. All present introduced themselves.

Approval of Agenda

One item was added to the agenda: discussion of the safety awareness program recently presented in Mono. On motion by Peter Stinson, seconded by Ken McGhee and carried, the agenda was approved as amended.

Approval of Minutes

On motion by Allen Taylor, seconded by Ken McGhee and carried, the minutes of the Joint Meeting of Dufferin Section 10 Police Services Boards held on April 30, 2010 were approved.

Speaker: Detective Constable Mark Taylor

Det. Mark Taylor then spoke on the history and mandate of the Central Region Rural Agricultural Crime Team, of which he is a member. The team consists of five officers who work with local front-line police staff on multi-jurisdictional investigations, ranging from murders to break and enters. Fuel and scrap metal are popular items for theft, and such thefts can have connections to organized crime operations. Det. Taylor pointed out that some municipalities have passed bylaws whereby pawn shops and scrap metal operations must take details of persons bringing articles for sale, thus assisting local police in tracing stolen items. Upon request by Ken McGhee, S/Sgt. Sills agreed to try and obtain samples of such bylaws for local police services boards.

Detective Taylor has an office at the Dufferin Detachment and thus is available to assist in the area.

Collection of POA offences fines

John Oosterhoff informed those present that the Provincial Offences Act Board has passed a motion

asking all Police Services Boards through their zones to support having the Ministry change the rules so that outstanding POA fines can be collected at the time of vehicle plate renewal, which is the way outstanding parking fines are currently collected. This was introduced at the Zone 5 meeting but not in time to be put on the agenda for the OAPSB Annual Conference. Local boards are asked to support and promote this resolution.

Items for Discussion

1. Detachment Commander/Staff Sergeant Steven Sills:

After distributing packages to each municipal police services board, Staff Sergeant Sills updated those present on a number of items, as follows:

- a. Constable Reg Hoover: Constable Hoover is going to retire. A farewell party will take place on June 12, 2011 at Monora Park Pavilion. Invitations were enclosed in the package.
- b. Detachment Commander Performance Assessment: An amended form was provided. Boards are asked to provide comments.
- c. 4 x 4 truck: The detachment now has a 4 x 4 truck.
- d. Dufferin Detachment address: The laneway from Highway 89 to the Dufferin Detachment building has been named George Reid Drive. (Since the meeting, it has been clarified that no actual change in the mailing address for the detachment has been made as yet.)
- e. Mobile Work Stations for Cruisers: The current unit is a mobile computer which docks in the cruiser. Soon there will be just a Blackberry-type of device which will cost less and will also include a GPS to provide the location of the cruiser. Sample units are being provided to police forces to try out - at no cost for the municipalities (funded by the OPP). Dufferin should have one up and running by the end of June. Cost for the first year would be about \$8,700; annual cost would be \$3,600.
- f. Civilian Data Entry: Two people should be ready to start by the end of May. Officers will be trained to work with the system. This would free up some officers to devote more of their time to pro-active policing. New recruits will do their own reports for a while to become familiar with the procedure, and will then go on the CDE system.
- g. Dissemination of information on major crimes investigations: e.g. the attempted murder in Mono. The Central Intelligence Branch Office gives out information on these investigations. It is a very sensitive issue; details appearing in the media can influence information being given by witnesses.
- h. Press coverage in local newspapers on Dufferin OPP: Two staff members will complete training as media officers by the end of May. They will put out regular media releases and monitor the results. Press releases will be issued about every two weeks with pro-active policing news as well as police reports.
- i. Noisy motorcycles: Caledon OPP with the Town of Caledon are looking at an instrument to measure the decibel/rpm on a motorcycle, currently being tested at the MTO.
- j. OPP 2010 Year End Report: The report for each municipality was included in the package.

2. Website for Dufferin County Police Services Boards: Peter Stinson of the Mulmur Police Services Board advised that a mock-up of the proposed website was sent to the chair of each

Board, and this was displayed to the meeting. Every Board has agreed to participate. The website will replace the annual newspaper to which every Board contributed at a total cost of about \$2,500. There will be a one-time cost of \$150 per municipality to set-up a domain and \$150 per year hosting fee. The IT person (from Mulmur) will also train a staff member from each municipality to maintain the page, if desired. Each Board's page can be updated at any time, and can be linked to the municipal website or have information on the page itself. There will also be a link to the OPP. After discussion, municipalities were asked to confirm their interest in participating in the website by the end of May.

Mono Family & Personal Safety Awareness Meeting: Ken McGhee advised that, following concerns expressed by Mono residents regarding personal safety, a meeting was hosted by Mono, Mono PSB, Dufferin OPP and MPP Sylvia Jones on Family & Personal Safety Awareness. It was open to all residents of Dufferin County. About 50 people attended, plus Barrie TV and cable. Feedback was positive and some suggestions will be put on Mono's website. There was some comment that the presentations could have been more oriented towards rural properties and could also have included something on self-defence. Possibly, another Police Services Board could host a follow-up meeting.

Date and location of next meeting: The next meeting will be held on Friday, October 21, 2011 at 9:00 a.m. and will be hosted by the East Luther Grand Valley Police Services Board at the East Luther Grand Valley Community Centre.

The meeting then adjourned and lunch was served.

Speaker:

Following lunch, Mr. Peter Osinga, Police Services Advisor with the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services, Public Safety Division, gave a presentation on Information on the Rules of the Police Act as they apply to Police Services Boards Members.

Re: Revised Estimated 2011 Policing Costs – Ontario Provincial Police (OPP)

Please find attached the revised estimated OPP policing costs for your municipality for the 2011 calendar year. These additional costs are in accordance with the recently signed amending agreement between your municipality and the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services, effective January 1, 2011. This revised annualized estimate reflects the staffing change for the Civilian Data Entry clerks. As this staffing adjustment is not expected to take place until late April 2011 the new monthly billing amount of \$29,496 will be in effect May 2011. The year end reconciliation will be prorated to the actual start dates.

The negotiated 2011 salaries from the 2011 – 2014 Memorandum of Understanding have been used to complete the estimate for the Civilian Data Entry clerks, as well a benefit rate of 17.46% for part time members has been used.

Please note, that interest will be charged on overdue accounts and is applied retroactively to outstanding accounts.

Dear *Mayor or Reeve and Council,*

Once again, provincial government policies and directives threaten services in your municipality.

The Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services has tendered a Request for Proposal (RFP) that would effectively transfer the authority of vehicle impoundments from the Ministry of Transportation to the OPP in the form of RFP OPP-0460. This will have a negative affect on the overall capacity of your local towing industry to serve our community.

This RFP has been tendered without consultation with you, our municipal representatives, and without us, your local tow service providers. It is designed for the administrative convenience of the OPP, not for the delivery of effective service on our roads. It removes the quality control of competition from the industry equation by creating monopolistic control over the delivery of impound services in 56 zones across the province.

Towers are an essential 4th component in keeping the roads safe in every community, but unlike the other 3 components; EMS, Fire and Police, we are strictly within the private domain and so must maintain and keep our equipment available for 24/7 emergency response at our own expense. Tows generated within the community by your contracted police service are an important source of revenue that supports your local towers and allows them to be there 24/7 for the community in times of need.

Simply put, if the OPP are allowed to impose their desire for exclusive, large scale impound lots on our communities, many local towers will eventually be forced out of business, people will have to travel greater distances at greater expense to reclaim their vehicles, and the number of local towers available to serve in times of emergency will be diminished. Not to mention the environmental impact of towing these vehicles the greater distances this plan will impose. It is also important to note that the impound facility for a zone listed in the RFP does not even have to be within that zone, thus creating further hardship and expense for those needing to reclaim an impounded vehicle.

We would urge you to pass a resolution opposing this RFP and the changes it proposes until such time that there has been adequate consultation with the industry, and you, our elected municipal representatives.

We further ask that you send this resolution to other municipalities requesting their support, and that all resolution be sent to the Minister of Community Safety and Correctional Services, so that this dangerous proposition can be halted.

Please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any questions or concerns regarding my firm position on this matter, and I look forward to your timely response.
